Reddy, associate professor of anthropology at the University of Illinois at Chicago, is a sociocultural anthropologist whose research and teaching interests lie at the intersections of sexuality, gender, health, and the politics of subject and community-formation in India, as well as within the immigrant South Asian queer community in the U.S.



**6:30 p.m. Shyam Selvadurai,** a widely published, award-winning author, was born in Colombo, Sri Lanka, in 1965. His novel *Funny Boy* draws on his experience of being gay in the violent 1980s of Sri Lanka.
