SEPTEMBER 6 | 4-6:30 P.M.

Gordon Parks's Curated Photographs and Ideas about Community

Aileen June Wang (Kansas State University), co-curator of the exhibition Homeward to the Prairie I Come: Gordon Parks Photographs from the Beach Museum of Art, discusses works by the legendary photographer, followed by a gallery reception to launch the Syracuse University Art Museum exhibition.

River Stories: A Research Methodologies Workshop

Communities of Care: Documenting Reproductive Justice in a Post-Roe Country

Light Work hosts a screening by The Abortion Clinic Film Collective, a group of six feminist filmmakers with diverse backgrounds and distinctive styles who came together from around the country in the wake of the overturning of Roe v Wade to document the impact of the ruling on their own communities. The program includes new work by award-winning filmmaker Lynne Sachs, who shot footage in Syracuse with local reproductive justice advocates from Layla's Got You.

Rupture, Resistance, and Community: The Crisis of Violence Against Women

In partnership with the Syracuse University Art Museum, and supported by the College of Arts & Sciences' Ray Smith Symposium, the South Asia Center presents an exhibition reception and screening with filmmaker **Coralynn Davis** to explore how painting and folktales help form community in the Mithila region, located on the Indian-Nepali border.

Each Moment Radiant: Music of Johannes Brahms and Kurt Erickson

Setnor School of Music faculty and guest musicians usher in Remembrance Week (October 20-26) with a performance of "Each Moment Radiant," a newly commissioned chamber work by composer **Kurt Erickson** and poet **Brian Turner** commemorating the Pan Am Flight 103 Disaster. Erickson and Turner's song cycle "Here, Bullet" and chamber music of Johannes Brahms complete the program.

Imagining Freedom: Developing Communities, Coalitions, and Digital Literacies in Prison

Although mainstream narratives often depict people in jails and prisons as dangerous, violent, illiterate, and disposable, **Brandon Erby** (University of Kentucky) reveals how imprisoned people build communities inside jails that counter these dominant portrayals of incarcerated individuals.

NOVEMBER 7 | 6-7:30 P.M.

Unpacking Prison Podcasts

Brandon Erby (University of Kentucky) conducts a workshop highlighting how developing community can be both physical and auditory. Registrants will learn how to recognize the features of prison podcasts, including how incarcerated individuals educate and commune with listening audiences via storytelling, charisma, emotional expression, and social analysis.
