In this keynote address with opening reception, Linda Infante Lyons explores her profound engagement with Indigenous traditions, resilience, and circumpolar landscapes to expand the idea of sovereignty. Infante Lyons' body of work illuminates the complex ways in which communities create, sustain, and nurture cultural life. The event also features the premiere unveiling of two Alaska Native icon portraits for SU Art Museum's permanent collection, made possible in part by the Humanities Center's J.K. Watson Professor award. Commentary follows with Indigenous artists <a href="Edward Hummingbird">Edward Hummingbird</a> (Cherokee Nation) and <a href="Brandon Lazore">Brandon Lazore</a> (Onondaga Nation Snipe Clan).

In this closing public event, Infante Lyons is joined by distinguished panelists **Sven Haakanson, Jr.** (University of Washington) and **Anna Kerttula de Echave** (National Science Foundation Arctic Social Sciences' former program director) for rich dialogue and reflection on how contemporary Indigenous artists and scholars navigate creative practice, cultural preservation, and community engagement in Arctic and sub-Arctic regions, particularly in times of environmental change and social upheaval.



## About Professor Infante Lyons...

Linda Infante Lyons is a painter and multimedia artist whose work engages themes of Indigenous sovereignty, cultural resilience, and environmental sustainability. Raised in Anchorage, Alaska, she earned her B.A. from Whitman College before spending 18 years in Chile and studying at the Viña del Mar Escuela de Bellas Artes. Her maternal family is from Kodiak Island, and her grandparents were commercial salmon fishers. She is a registered Alutiiq Alaska Native and has tribal affiliation with the Alutiiq / Sugpiaq corporation, Koniag.
